

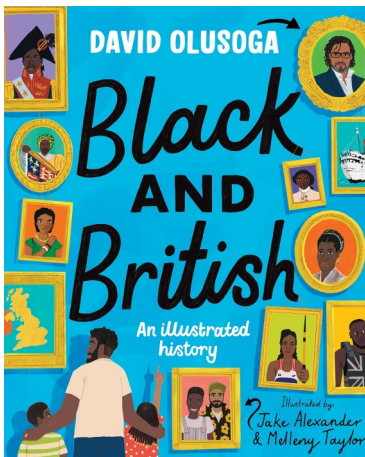

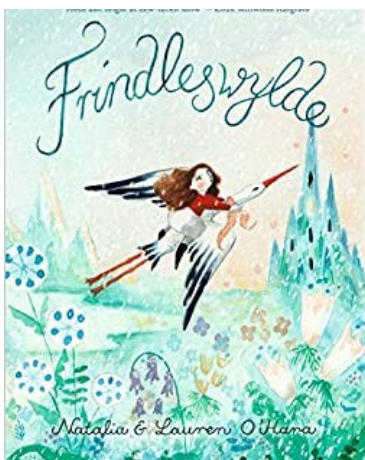
## Non Fiction:



### Black and British by David Olusoga

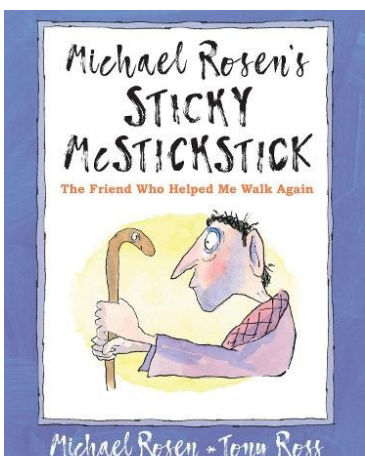
## Fiction:

To escape his clutches, she must complete three Impossible Tasks. Wonderfully wintry images in a gorgeous limited palette and a compelling story make this a perfect seasonal read aloud with an empowering feminist message about standing up for what is right.
