It is typically aimed at tourists so must be small so they can be easily transported and the subjects are intended to appeal to European and American (e.g., The big 5, Wild fauna) Famous The lion, Peacock on the Baobab Paintings Tree, Antelope, Leopard, Buffalo, or Monkey Vibrant col-Vivid, bright colours which usually ours represent excitement and optimism. E.g., Red, orange, pink, bright green, blue and purple. Colour White: spirituality and purity. It is not seen in a lot of clothing because it is reserved for the purest people and situations. Gold: wealth and fertility. Green: prosperity and health in life. Red: representative of trouble either in the political world or tensions spiritually. Blue: love and peace. It symbolizes earth. the sky, and water.
