School expectations	Our expectations make our responsibilities clear. There are consequences for failing to follow the expectations.
Rights of the child	United Nations Convention on the Rights of a Child contains 45 rights that all children are entitled to. Every child has rights, whatever their ethnicity, gender, religion, language, abilities or any other status.
Responsibility	The things you are expected to do. Being responsible means you do what you are meant to do.
Differences in responsibilities	People experience different responsibilities in their different communities. E.g., you may be responsible for setting the table at home but not at school.
Conflict	A disagreement between two ideas, views or opinions.
Laws in society	Laws are in place to keep society safe. The police enforce laws. Laws affect different age groups e.g., from the age of 10 you have full criminal responsibility.
Positive influence	To have a beneficial effect on others.

Local councils	A group of volunteers elected by local people to make decisions about local issues such as planning applications, road works and refuse collection.
